COVID-19 Cases in U.S. Nursing Homes Remain at Historic Lows


Only a small number of nursing homes are reporting cases—primarily in communities with high spread and low vaccination rates among the general public.


Since the vaccines were offered in long term care in late December, new resident cases were declining and for months, have been at historic lows since the beginning of the pandemic.







While nursing homes have seen a slight uptick over the last three weeks as cases rise across the country, cases are still below where they were in May.








Vaccination rates among the general population correlate with nursing home cases.

Nursing homes in low vaccinated counties had five times the number of cases than those in highly vaccinated counties, regardless of staff vaccination rates.







Staff vaccination is important, but it's not the only solution.

The small portion of nursing homes that are experiencing new cases are typically bigger facilities in urban communities that are experiencing high spread and low vaccination rates among the general public where the virus is more easily transmissible.

Quality metrics, such as the facility's Five-Star rating and total nurse hours, are <u>not</u> associated.
